

North Florida's Hidden Crisis: Mapping the Need

Understanding our local data is the first step toward building sustainable solutions that truly move our communities forward.

When we look at the breathtaking growth, vibrant culture, and historic campuses across the North Florida region, it is easy to assume that everyone is sharing in that prosperity. But local data reveals a parallel reality. Recent regional needs assessments and demographic profiles paint a stark picture: a staggering number of our neighbors are working harder than ever but are still slipping through the systemic cracks.

To build programs that truly move people forward, we must first look honestly at the local data.

The Hidden Crisis: Living Below the "Survival Line"

According to recent asset and income data compiled by United Way networks across North Florida, nearly **40% of households** across our communities do not earn enough to cover the basic costs of living. While a portion of these families live below the federal poverty line, the vast majority fall into a critical category known as ALICE: **A**sset **L**imited, **I**ncome **C**onstrained, **E**mployed.

These are our local working families—childcare workers, retail teams, administrative staff, and young professionals—who earn above the technical "poverty line" but find themselves just one unexpected medical bill or car repair away from complete financial crisis. In fact, recent data shows that necessities like housing, food, and transportation are currently outpacing local wage increases by a wide margin.

Key Gaps Identified in Recent Assessments

Local health and behavioral health needs assessments conducted throughout regional circuits point to three critical barriers holding our communities back:

- **The Affordability Gap for Seniors:** Rapidly rising rents and cost of living are severely outpacing fixed retirement incomes, leaving nearly **49% of our senior households** struggling to make ends meet.
- **Access to Coordinated Care:** From the rural counties of the Big Bend to under-resourced pockets in urban centers like Jacksonville, lack of transportation and specialized outreach remains a massive hurdle to healthcare, mental health resources, and family stability.
- **Demographic Disparities:** Financial hardship impacts our communities disproportionately, with data indicating that **51% of Black households** in the region struggle to meet the baseline survival budget due to historic and systemic resource gaps.
